The Regent Park Focus - O'Connor partnership provides out of work and out of school youth a chance to give back to their community and gain some employable skills at the same time. Our partnership with them comes in the form of media journalism training. This session we have a group of six enthusiastic youth who will be learning how to produce videos, radio programs and magazine articles, all from the ground up.

After only four weeks, the youth have grasped the basic concepts of video production - equipment setup, angles, and interview skills - and some are even in the post production training, learning the ins and outs of professional editing. The videos they're working on will explore an issue the participants are passionate about.

We've also already had several guests - including documentary director Craig Goodwill, who have come in to talk to the group and answer questions they have about the video industry or how to get funding for projects they may want to do after they finish the program. In the future we plan on taking them to video production and editing studios to help them make the connections they'll need if they want to pursue a career in video making. If you took a stroll through Regent Park on a Tuesday or Thursday at 5:30 amongst the noise of children playing you would hear the prolific sounds coming from the 'basement' aka Regent Focus. This is the place for Toronto's upcoming artists come to hone their God given talents into a sound that will soon be saturating the airwaves worldwide. This is a place for the musically inclined and those who want to learn for the love of it. Artists can be as young as ten, creating original music including lyrics, beats and the melody. All four stations in the studio are filled to capacity, each artist downloading their creative juices into every bar while adding a syncopated bopping head the universal sign of approval.

Currently there are three sessions weekly, one on Tuesday and two on Thursdays, with plans to add more as demand is greater than available space. Youth are given a chance to learn about composing & recording with computers, using tools & software of professional quality, working with Artists-In-Residence Mathew, Rick and Phil.
